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WORLD WAR II

Five Uneasy Pieces: Key Decisions that Changed World War II Speaker: Richard Stewart, Ph.D.

MAYAN RUINS

Kohunlich is a gem on the road less traveled. Draped in rainforest vegetation, silent and majestic, its pyramids, citadels, ball court, and plazas inexorably lead you to the Temple of the Masks. Eight-foot high staring stucco masks adorn the temple. Neon-blue morpheus butterflies swirl amidst the many unexcavated ruins. Two hours by air conditioned motorcoach from Costa Maya. Kohunlich both is raw and elemental and demonstrates the sophistication of Maya cities. You owe it to yourself to explore Kohunlich, a lightly visited and nonetheless stunning Mava site.
